President's Message



2011 Financial Results

Our 2011 Financial Results were released on February 16, 2012. Consolidated revenue for the year was \$582.7 million which was a 9% increase over our previously reported 2010 CGAAP consolidated revenue. The main factor contributing to this increase in revenue from 2010 was the increased utilization experienced by both our Domestic Dry-Bulk and our Domestic Product Tanker fleets.

Net earnings for 2011 of \$68.8 million were up significantly over our 2010 Canadian CGAAP reported net earnings of \$32.6 million. The major factors contributing to this increase were:

- Strong Domestic Dry-Bulk utilization and improved expense ratios
- Strong Domestic Product Tanker utilization and continued cost control

- Accretive impact of the Upper Lakes transaction
- Timing of the Upper Lakes transaction which impacted the accounting for the significant first quarter loss that is typical of the Domestic Dry-Bulk segment

All four business segments showed an improvement over 2010 although the most significant increase was in the Domestic Dry-Bulk segment.

We are very pleased with our 2011 results and look forward to further improvements in 2012.

Road to Zero

During 2011, we continued our strong focus on worker safety practises and programs with the goal to achieve zero personal injury incidents throughout the Corporation. Although this goal has not yet been achieved, I am pleased to report that our Product Tanker segment achieved zero personal injury incidents in 2011.

This is а very significant accomplishment and all Product Tanker employees should be commended and congratulated for this achievement. It is proof that our goal is within reach. I am also pleased to note that in 2011 our lost time injury frequency per 200,000 hours for all business units combined was reduced by 27% from 2010 and by 54% over the last five years.

I would like to thank and congratulate all employees for their continued focus on this very important area.

Corporation of the Year

On March 22, 2012 the Corporation was presented with the "Corporation of the Year" award at the recognition dinner for the United Way of St. Catharines & District. This award is presented to the organization with the largest annual Campaign contribution increase over the previous year.

I am very proud of all employees who made this very noteworthy award possible by supporting United Ways all across Canada.

Equinox Class

Our Equinox Class order from Nantong Mingde Shipyard in China now stands at eight vessels. Four gearless bulkers and four self-unloaders, with six to be owned and operated by Algoma and two to be owned by the Canadian Wheat Board and managed by Algoma.

The steel has been cut for seven of the eight vessels and the keel laying took place for the first two, the *Algoma Equinox* and *Algoma Harvester*, on April 21st. We expect these first two vessels to be launched from the slipway this September and October and to be delivered in China in the first quarter of 2013.

It is also our expectation that they will be in service in Canada by the 2^{nd} quarter of 2013. The remaining six vessels will follow through 2013 and into the 1^{st} half of 2014.

On April 21st, 2012 the keel laying ceremonies for Algoma Equinox (Hull 149) and Algoma Harvester (Hull 150) took place on Slipway No.3 at Nantong Mingde Heavy Industry. Senior VP Technical, AI Vanagas and Project Manager, Laurence Williams oversaw the placement of the first two (of 135 per ship) blocks on the building berth, an event which marks the beginning of the three month process of their erection into the launch-ready hulls. The classical shipbuilding method of aligning the keel plate, the ship's backbone on the slipway followed by piecemeal assembly of every individual part was replaced with block construction, when American Industrial, Henry J. Kaiser revolutionized shipbuilding through the application of mass production techniques to the construction of Liberty ships during WWII. To this day, the keel laying ceremony remains an important milestone in the construction of any ship.

Elsewhere in the shipyard, blocks for the next two bulkers (151 and 152) as well as the first self -unloader (153) are in various stages of completion. Plates are cut to exact shape and are mated with stiffeners, as small pieces are joined together into subassemblies of ever increasing size. The flow of these materials through the shops follows a thoroughly planned and programmed sequence to ensure that painted and partially-outfitted (with piping and some electrical elements) blocks are ready to feed uninterrupted progress on the slipway, as the clock counts down to launch day.

Of course, the Algoma site team, currently numbering ten (10) people is kept busy with oversight of quality / quantity, inspections and testing including off-site factory acceptance tests (FATs) of all critical equipment. At the time of writing, the first main engine has just been tested and accepted at Hyundai Heavy Industries in Ulsan, Republic of Korea.

A noteworthy initiative is the Wartsila Exhaust Gas Scrubber which is state of the art equipment to be fitted to every ship and will virtually eliminate oxides of sulphur in exhaust from the main engine, generators and thermal oil heater. Algoma engineers have been intimately involved in the adaption of this equipment to our Equinox class.

Much is underway in Nantong and it is certain that the pace will quicken for our people on site, since all eight (8) Equinox vessels will be in production in the yard during the fourth quarter of 2012. We look forward to the new vessels' addition to a rejuvenated Algoma fleet in 2013 and their service for years to come.

2012 Winter Work

The *Algolake* received new longitudinal bulkheads in Cargo Hold #3, new plastic liners in her holds and underwent her Intermediate Special Survey (ITSS) repairs to her ballast tanks.

The *Algorail* also went through her ITSS; together with the *Algolake's* work, this constituted almost 280,000lbs of steel renewal.

The Algoma Navigator received nearly 90,000lbs of steel to complete her ITSS and the Algoma Provider took on over 80,000lbs of steel repairs to complete her Special Survey Laker (SSL).

The *Algoway* went through her SSL with over 30,000lbs of internal repairs.

The Algoma Enterprise's ITSS required over 50,000lbs of steel and the Algosteel had over 75,000lbs of steel renewals.
