#### President's Message



The Algoma Equinox departed the shipyard on October 1<sup>st</sup> exactly three years to the day from when Minister Flaherty announced the removal of the 25% import duty on vessels constructed outside of Canada.

That announcement was the catalyst leading to the eight Equinox Class vessels being ordered from Nantong Mingde Shipyard in China. The time was now right to renew our fleet and, with that, raise the standards in Canadian marine transportation.

We knew we had the opportunity to create something that was innovative and game changing and following extensive computer modelling, tank testing and brainstorming we did exactly that.

The Equinox Class vessels will carry more cargo at faster speeds while using less power and producing significantly lower emissions per tonne kilometre than any similar sized Great Lakes vessel in existence today. In addition, the installation of exhaust gas scrubbers on all eight Equinox Class vessels will capture 97% of the sulphur emissions before being released into the atmosphere. The Equinox Class vessels create a win-win situation. We win because we burn less fuel, we go faster and we carry more cargo yet at the same time we achieve huge environmental benefits. It is a win for efficiency and a win for the environment.

The Algoma Equinox, the first of the Equinox Class series, is now in service in Canada and is performing as expected. The picture below shows the vessel unloading its first cargo of iron ore at Dofasco in Hamilton.

#### Sustainability Report

Another highlight for 2013 was the publishing of our first Sustainability Report. This report replaces the Environmental Report but is substantially broader, providing a detailed report card on all aspects of the Corporation's sustainability performance. The 2013 Report Sustainability highlights performance against metrics for safety, community involvement, environmental impact and governance.

#### **Third Quarter Results**

On November 8th we announced our third quarter results. 2013 continued to be challenging especially for our domestic dry-bulk segment where operating results are down significantly. Fortunately our Domestic Product Tanker fleet continues to experience high utilization and has been able to provide somewhat of an offset.

On the bright side, our Balance Sheet remains very strong and we announced a further 7c per share dividend payable on December 2<sup>nd</sup>. This dividend brings the total dividends for 2013 to 28c, an increase of 27% compared to 2012.

#### <u>ESPP</u>

As a reminder, you can share in these dividends if you enrol in the Algoma Employees Share Purchase Program (ESPP). This program allows employees to invest in Algoma Central Corporation shares through regular payroll deductions. The ESPP is open to all permanent employees of the Corporation.

#### Technology and Innovation Award

On October 24<sup>th</sup> we were recognized at the 10<sup>th</sup> Annual Niagara Business Achievement Awards by being awarded the "Technology and Innovation Award". We are very pleased with this award as it is further recognition of the outstanding work that has been accomplished on the new Equinox Class vessels.

During 2013, we continued our strong focus on worker safety with the goal to achieve zero personal injury incidents throughout the Corporation. I am pleased to report that in 2013 we continued our record of improvement in our lost time injury frequency per 200,000 hours. In fact, for 2013 our lost time injury frequency is below 1.0 for the first time. I would like to congratulate all employees for their continued diligence in ensuring they and their fellow co-workers work safely.

#### **Operations Excellence - OGV Port Cartier Top Off**

In May 2013 Algoma was given the opportunity to work with one of our customers, ArcelorMittal, to help increase iron ore throughput at their Port Cartier, Quebec facility. Significant investments and improvements have been made to the Port Cartier operation however Cape Sized ,Ocean Going Vessels (OGV) are presently not able to load to their maximum capacity because of draft restrictions at the loading dock. This restriction has resulted in the OGVs leaving Port Cartier with less than optimum cargo tonnages which increase the delivered cost of Arcelor Mittal's iron ore. As Algoma is a long time service provider to their company, ArcelorMittal approached Algoma with a request to provide a solution to this issue.

Algoma accepted this challenge and went to work to find solutions to maximize the OGV's cargo deadweight departing Port Cartier for sea passage. Algoma's past experience in ship to ship transfers was core to the solution presented to the customer. In the spirit of One Vision, One Purpose, One Team all departments mustered together to devise a simple but effective solution. The Commercial Department set out to develop a contractual relationship incorporating Algoma's self un-loaders and started exploring the best options for scheduling Algoma vessels to meet the requirements of the OGV top offs. The Operations Department's Ports & Harbours

group in conjunction with the *Algoma Mariner's* (the vessel nominated to be the "test" vessel) Captain and crew commenced the development of Ship to Ship Transfer protocols, procedures and checklists. In addition to developing the frame work for the transfer, this group conducted an environmental study and set the ground work for the logistics of the entire transfer operations. Crewing requirements, changes to standard ship operations, mooring arrangements, self-unloading practices and equipment operation were all aspects of the project that were reviewed, supplemented and modified where required. The Technical Services group went to work exploring layouts and modelling deck edges and boom angles to ensure the top off was possible without using additional bumper boats.

In one of the early cross disciplinary brainstorming sessions, it became evident that to meet our customers' requirements in topping off the OGV's, a method of trimming the cargo holds (leveling out the cargo in the holds) on the OGV would be a critical piece of the puzzle in order to meet regulatory cargo stowage requirements for the fully loaded OGV ocean passage.

### **Operations Excellence (continued)**

Different options for loading the OGV were explored that would ensure an even cargo distribution in the OGV's cargo hold, but until these methods were refined, a secondary method of mechanical trimming had to be put in place. To eliminate third party participation that would drive up the costs of the complete operation and place undue dependency outside of the organization, it was decided to use a bull dozer for the back up trimming method. In order to do this, a complete engineering analysis of the *Algoma Mariner's* unloading equipment was completed in-house and verified by independent experts. Upon completion of the study, Algoma Ship Repair was brought in to provide additional engineering knowledge and expertise on how to fabricate and install the boom strengthening while the *Algoma Mariner* continued in coastal service. The *Algoma Mariner* is now self sufficient in being able to pick up an eight ton bull dozer from the dock, sail out to the transfer anchorage and lower into the OGV's holds to provide final trimming of cargo if required.

To date, Algoma has conducted three trial OGV top offs. Each trial had a pre-determined cargo transfer plan that was developed in conjunction with the Captain of the OGV. The plan also included training guidelines for the vessel crews and shore personnel involved and a methodology for task specific operational assumptions and engineering calculations to be verified. As a result, each of the trials has seen successive improvements.

The OGV top off project has highlighted the teamwork at Algoma, featured Algoma's professional officers and crews, and showcased Algoma's new generations of self-unloaders in assisting our customers with cost savings, while developing new business in a competitive market place.

### **Equinox Vessel Update**

Algoma Equinox's recent successful delivery and entry into service is cause of celebration, which we do with enthusiasm. At this time, let us review the current activities underway in Nantong, which involve the simultaneous construction of seven (7) additional ships for Algoma Central Corporation.

All but one (1) of the blocks (100-200 tonne sub-assemblies) which compose the main hull including the Upper and Focsle Decks have been erected on the slipway, completely welded into a single structure, inspected and accepted by Algoma's site team specialists. The final hull block will be erected (lifted into place on the building berth) once the Main Engine and Generating Sets have been lowered and installed in the ship.

In the meantime, outfitting of the engine room and superstructure continues apace, as the hull is slowly transformed from a steel box into a ship. It's a grand steel box perhaps, but yet one without capability or purpose. These will be developed in the coming months as all necessary systems are installed and along with them, a fully-functional vessel completed. Likewise in parallel with the hull, the superstructure, although not currently installed on the hull is in an advanced state of completion. Pre-outfitting of the three (3) blocks that make up the superstructure has progressed as far as is possible and are ready for sandblasting and coating in the paint sheds.

The stern tube and rudder alignment will be carried out in December, once the main machinery items have been installed and their weight added to the whole.

The external shell plating, water ballast spaces and cargo holds have been sandblasted and painted, including all underwater plating between the bottom shell and slipway supports. The entire painting effort will be completed by mid-December.

The *CWB Marquis* is partially erected on the slipway. The vessel occupies one of a pair of parallel slipways, the one vacated by *Algoma Equinox* (Hull No. MD149) during launch. She follows the *Algoma Harvester* in the production sequence, so is accordingly less complete than MD150. The *CWB Marquis* is growing staunch and true, like her name sake - the four (4) cargo hold division bulkheads being particularly evident in the photo.

Inspection of the following photos will reveal the scale of the undertaking. Most of those blocks are destined for our fleet, and are being stockpiled around the shipyard. Our team will ensure that all blocks are blasted to 'like new' condition and applied with first class coatings. No stain will be left unturned.

We all share the pleasure of welcoming the *Algoma Equinox* into the fleet and congratulate the vessel staff on their accomplishment. Rest assured that we will repeat that experience many times in the coming year. An honourable mention is due to Mr. Jonny Gu, Manager and Senior Member of our site team who, in addition to knowing how to build ships is no slouch with a camera and provided these photos, as well as status update. ## **Algoma Ship Repair**

It looks to be a busy winter works in 2014 at Algoma Ship Repair. Already, our fabrication shop is at work making cargo hopper gates for the *Peter R Cresswell* and *Algoma Transport*. There are tank top panels to be welded up for the *Algoma Transport* and *Algoma Enterprise* as well as shell renewal panels for the *John D Leitch*.

In Sarnia, we expect to see the *Algoway*, *Algoma Olympic* and *Peter R Cresswell*. The *Cresswell* will have the aforementioned gates installed, 34 in all, as well as some repairs to her screen bulkheads (cargo hold divisional bulkheads). The *Algoma Olympic* will get her long awaited side tank bulkheads fitted in way of Nos. 2 & 3 water ballast tanks as well as miscellaneous tank top repairs.

In Port Colborne we will be working on the *John D Leitch* shell repairs and installing the last two deck arches and the longitudinal side tank bulkheads in Hold No.3 on the *John B Aird*. The *Algoma Enterprise* will get about one third of her tank top renewed similar to the *Algoma Transport*.

In Hamilton, the three sister ships, *Algoma Spirit*, *Algoma Discovery* and *Algoma Guardian* will be together for miscellaneous repairs and engine room piping. The *Algoma Transport* will get the second installment of her tank top panels and the *Algoma Equinox* will probably arrive later in the winter to get her DVS (Delivery Voyage Strengthening) removed prior to sailing the lakes next season. This will amount to about 250 tons of steel removed meaning she will be able to carry that much more in cargo at Seaway drafts.
