President's Message



2012 Financial Results

consolidated The Corporation's \$560.4 revenues were million compared to \$582.7 million in 2011. This \$22.3 million decrease was due mainly to reduced utilization of our domestic fleet. Net earnings for 2012 were \$43.8 million or \$1.13 per share compared to our 2011 net earnings of \$68.8 million or \$1.77 per share. The main factor impacting the comparability of 2012 and 2011 was the timing of the ULG transaction in 2011. Had the transaction occurred at January 1, 2011 instead of April 14, 2011 the reported net earnings for 2011 would have been reduced by \$15.1 million to \$53.7 million. The balance of the variance was due to non-cash foreign exchange and income tax adjustments.

Canada's Best Managed

On February 26, 2013 it was announced in the National Post that Algoma Central Corporation was named as one of Canada's Best Managed Companies in 2012. I refer you to the last page to see a copy of our advertisement that ran in the National Post that day.

Canada's Best Managed Companies, the country's leading business awards program recognizing excellence in Canadian owned and managed companies was established in 1993. Every year the program announces 50 winners from the hundreds of companies that compete for this designation in a rigorous and independent process that evaluates the caliber of their management abilities and practices.

Following a game-changing 2011, Algoma's shore-side and shipboard personnel came together with ONE Vision, ONE Purpose and as ONE Team to drive the Corporation forward to further success in 2012. I am proud of the hard work and dedication of each and every one of over 2,000 employees. Without them, this award would not have been possible." And again, I extend my thank you and congratulations to every employee for the part they played in this outstanding achievement.

Equinox Class

Construction of the eight Equinox Class vessels continues at Nantong Mingde Shipyard in China. Recent milestones for the first vessel, the *Algoma Equinox*, were the launching on December 24th and the Naming Ceremony on April 7th. We expect delivery of the *Algoma Equinox* this summer in China with the vessel going into service in Canada two months later.

I wish to thank all who participated in our "Name the Vessel" contest. This contest resulted in almost 400 names being submitted for consideration.

Marine Money Award

We were recently advised that Algoma had placed 6th in the Marine Money Magazine 2012 rankings of 84 worldwide publicly traded shipping companies. This follows our 5th place ranking in 2011.

The annual Marine Money Rankings which are designed to measure a company's ability to improve operating efficiency and to create shareholder value are based on an average of measures including total return to shareholders, return on equity, return on assets, total asset turnover and price to book ratio.

Essentially what this ranking says about Algoma is that we are a "World Class Shipping Organization".

Employee Share Purchase Plan (ESPP)

The Algoma ESPP commenced in November 2012 and was rolled out to shipboard personnel during our winter

meetings and during the spring fit-out meetings. This program allows all permanent employees of Algoma to invest in Algoma Central Corporation (ALC-T) shares through regular payroll deduction. Haniff is well known for his traditional dishes from his homeland in Guyana. Anyone who has been onboard the Radcliffe R Latimer and had enjoy chance to his а Guyanese Curry, will know why Haniff has shared his recipe for others to enjoy. Haniff also great help receives from Captain Vautier who also loves to cook. Together the two enquire and experience all sorts of new recipes to give the crew a wider variety and healthier choices of food.

Chief Cook Spotlight

Guyanese Style Curry Chicken

- 1 whole chicken cut in pieces
- 2 diced onions
- 2-3 cloves of crushed garlic
- 2 medium potatoes
- ¹/₄ tablespoon garam masala
- ¹/₂ teaspoon cumin (jeera)
- ³/₄ teaspoon salt
- 1 carrot
- ¹/₂ teaspoon of fresh ginger
- 2-3 tablespoon of curry powder

Heat vegetable oil in medium pan. Blend onion, garlic, ginger and carrot separately. When oil is heated, add the blended ingredients. Stir blended ingredients with hot oil and then add garam masala, cumin and curry powder. Let the above ingredients cook for several minutes and add the chicken and potatoes. Cover the pan for approximately 2-3 minutes and add two cups of water. The purpose of covering the ingredients before adding water is to let the spices blend into the chicken. Let it cook slowly on medium heat.

Shrimp in Coconut Cream Sauce

- 1 pound of peeled shrimp 4 medium potatoes diced $\frac{1}{2}$ cup chopped onions 3 tablespoons of olive oil 1 tablespoon of curry powder 3 cloves of garlic minced ¹/₂ diced tomatoes 1 cup of coconut cream or milk 2 teaspoon of paprika
- 2 stalks of scallions chopped
- 1 teaspoon of thyme leaves
- 2 chili peppers diced
- 1/2 cup walnut

Heat oil on medium heat. Add potato and sauté over low heat until tender, stirring constantly. Add onions, peppers, tomatoes, thyme leaves, scallions and sauté until onions are transparent. Add garlic, paprika and curry powder. Let the ingredients continue to cook for three minutes. stirring constantly. Add shrimp. After shrimp cooks for a minute, add coconut milk. Once the milk is added let it simmer for a couple minutes and then remove from stove. Serve with rice.

Employee Share Purchase Program

The Company-wide ESPP commenced on November 15, 2012. All permanent employees are eligible to participate in the ESPP. If you are interested in learning more, or in enrolling in the plan, you are encouraged to contact Terry Cochrane at (905) 687-7812.

What is the ESPP?

- The ESPP is a program which allows employees to invest in Algoma Central Corporation (ALC-T) shares through regular payroll deduction.
- A plan administrator has been appointed who will purchase shares on the employees' behalf into a pooled account.
- Algoma will pay the cost of acquiring the shares.
- The account you set up to hold the shares can be either a non-registered account, an RRSP account or a tax-free savings account (TFSA).

The hard work and dedication shown by Mingde Heavy Industry and the site team is truly comforting, knowing that high quality ships will be delivered to Algoma.

The naming ceremony was very regal and impressive, and I was very proud to be in attendance. They really know how to celebrate the naming of the vessel. with new а speeches, the ceremonial champagne bottle breaking and the great tour of the ship. excitement The day's continued into the night with a reception to complete the celebration, which I very much enjoyed as did everyone that I was talking to.

Along with the official dinners and ceremony, it was a great opportunity to meet the executive team and get to know them better. It was nice to celebrate with them as well as meet Mr. Duncan Jackman, Chairman of Algoma. Vessel Status Overview - June 2013

Everyone at Algoma is anticipating the delivery of the first Equinox vessel as the shipyard's production work on *Algoma Equinox* comes closer to completion. In the next few weeks the shipyard will start systems commissioning and the delivery crew of the vessel will make ready for systems familiarization and equipment training.

Exterior Hull:

The *Algoma Equinox* was docked in order for the shipyard to complete outstanding exterior hull work, such as hull coatings, rudder work and inspection after launching.

As Algoma Equinox was the first Algoma Laker launched from a slipway, it was important to view and identify any potential issues – fortunately only minor launching issues were found and these are being taken care of by the shipyard.

Dry-dock work is expected to be completed in the next few weeks.

Main Deck and Cargoholds:

The main deck work is well advanced with such major items as the DVS (Delivery Voyage Strengthening) already installed. All pipe and cable conduit systems are installed and the main cable runs for the forward equipment are being pulled.

Hatch coamings and hatch covers are complete, the accommodation ladder installed (in the delivery voyage location) and freefall lifeboat davit installed.

The cargoholds are progressing well with the outfitting work complete and over 80% of the coatings applied.

Engine room and machinery spaces: Main engine installation and alignment are complete and the major equipment is already installed. The

shipyard is finalising engine room systems and pressure testing and flushing of piping has started.

Accommodation Spaces:

The electrical and piping outfit work in the accommodation area is near completion and deck coverings are advancing. Accommodation internal finishing work, such as insulation, lining installation, deck coverings and furniture are ready to follow.

The accommodation areas on the Equinox class vessels are well equipped and comfortable. The smallest of the crew cabins is 15m² and all have private washrooms. Cabin temperature is controlled through a dual duct heating and cooling system (this is the type of system used in 5 star hotels), where each duct delivers different temperature air (hot and warm in winter, or cold and cool in summer) to the cabins and each cabin has a local air regulator for temperature control – no electric re-heaters are required. Cabins are fitted out with sleep, work and sitting areas and each cabin is equipped with connections to broadband internet and satellite TV. Beds are all full size and attention has been paid to isolate accommodation areas from machinery spaces and therefore limit noise and vibration transfer levels.

Algoma Ship Repair

Winter Works 2013 started early for ASR when cracks were discovered in the crankshaft of the *Algosea*. A new crankshaft was flown in and ASR was tasked with removing the old and replacing with the new. This task involved lifting the 40 tonne engine 6 feet in the air and removing the 12 tonne old crank from the engine, up two decks and out the side of the engine room through two fuel tanks. The new crankshaft went in the opposite way and was in place on time and on budget.



The regular Winter Works 2013 program was in full swing by the time the *Algosea's* crankshaft was going in. The workforce at ASR swelled to over 220 employees to accommodate the program which is down from previous years. The major projects this winter were:

1. The partial renewal of the cargo hold tank top on the Algoma Transport;



2. The renewal of the deck arches on the John B. Aird;

3. The renewal of the longitudinal bulkheads in way of #1 WB Tanks, P & S on the Algoma Olympic.
